

DSLs, SLT and Governors/Trustees are invited to **reflect** upon the slides and use these to assure themselves that colleagues in their school have an evidenced understanding of KCSIE and ultimately, that they understand their roles and responsibilities in keeping children safe.








Our quizzes had several questions where staff were asked to distinguish between a low level concern and an allegation.

Do you provide explicit examples of both allegations and low level concerns?




